Lots of communication from champions to staff.



Express gratitude for small and big wins ("thanks for placing those orders before noon!") and to interdisciplinary team for participating.



Promote a community feel among all caregivers – that the patients are part of the community too.



Post positive statistics for all to see.



Share success stories back to the front line.



Remind everyone that these interventions and initiatives improve care for patients and also department function.

Focus on the **positive**: give staff something that helps their patients AND the department (and that isn't just about COVID)



One SIMPLE intervention:

Caregivers are ESSENTIAL —
both for better patient care and for better hospital functioning.



Find ways to integrate interdisciplinary team into the ED.



One COMPLEX intervention:
Keep sustainability in mind from
the beginning: think about finances
of interventions.



Use the power of narrative to drive decision-making and change:
One bad outcome can have a powerful effect as a change motivator for staff and leadership.

Focus on COVID-relevant care – delirium identification, prevention, management.



Share success stories – patient narratives inspire front line to adopt interventions



Work with existing strengths in your system, and build upon them.



Share data, stats and numbers, individualized feedback.



Find key collaborators (IT partners, system-level planners) to work with.



Reward excellent performance.

Remember, new staff and travel nurses need to be trained and acculturated.

Screening had to be added to travel orientation.



Pick your battles: know when to push and when not to.



Champions are essential. Nursing, Resident, Physician Champions – the more members of the team we integrate the more creative solutions we discover!



Use team-based competition, rewards, and add gamification to incentivize people.
(In larger systems, this could be




Use tracking boards to identify superstars and flag areas for improvement.

Recognize that different parts of the same system can be like different little civilizations. Treat them differently.




