



ASSESSING & IMPROVING THE EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT ENVIRONMENT FOR DEMENTIA PATIENTS

To aid in orientation and reduce patient stress, consider

- Clocks and calendars
- Natural lighting
- Glare-free, noise-reducing doors
- Clear signage for wayfinding
- Proximity to nursing station

Assess the ED environment for senior-friendly elements:









- (A) Assessment of ED cubicle (e.g., the availability of working call bell, orientation cues, chairs for patient support persons).
- **(B)** The availability of (inflated) pres-sure ulcer mattresses.
- **(C)** Evidence of a standardized method to identify pain in patients with cognitive impairment (sign on wall in ED cubicle of one of the participating hospitals).
- (D) The use of signs and symbols to communicate messages/information to ED patients
