How does ageism present itself in your ED?

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Expectation and assumptions of what "old" looks like

Forgetting core clinical teaching: delirium and dementia are not the same!

Perception that caring for older patients is timeconsuming and slow

Under-triage; underrecognition of geriatric syndromes

Dismissive language and behaviour

Assumption of frailty and dependence and impairment as a norm

Institutional lack of resources for older people

Not recognizing agerelated difference

Potential for quality-of-care inequity

Lack of physical infrastructure: signage, beds,

Language: "social admission", "community admission", "failure to cope"

Not addressing "what matters most"



Take away points: Marcus Escobedo

- 1. Start with yourself:
 - Check your own internalized ageism and use these tools to reframe your own language and behavior.
 - Model and influence others' behaviors. In particular, use inclusive language that aging is about all of us.
- 2. Call out and define ageism when you see it. Use a fairness and justice frame
- 3. Use <u>www.ReframingAging.org</u> resources

Take away points: Nida Degesys

- 1. Clinicians, both doctors and nurses, have been trained to believe that "normal" is the same for *all* adults. Think again.
- 2. Much research about clinical conditions is inherently ageist. The results and their guidance need to be interpreted through an antiageist lens.
- 3. Older adults generally don't present with "classic" symptoms in the way we have been trained to expect.
- The patient must be the central person in the conversation. Welcome caregivers with the patient -- but do not defer to them.

Take away points: Dyan Hagy

- 1. Identify your biases and their impact on patient care
- 2. Make SMALL changes. Regardless of your system's size and mission, find ways to include age-specific questions in your assessments and age-appropriate additions to your care plans.
- 3. Advocate for change within your system: addition of care processes, transitions of care, addition of education, changing strategic priorities for the ED and hospital.

Take away points: Brittany Palladino

- 1. Use your resources, whatever they may be, to provide the best care and care plan: with these interdisciplinary and community resources you can collaborate to provide creative, age-appropriate, patient-centered care.
- 2. Educate yourself! Increase your self-awareness and knowledge of how you do care vs. how you should care for older patients.
- 3. Advocate for your patient. Take a moment to *hear* them and what their needs are. Advocate for that care.


